

ANNUAL REPORT 2023

FRIENDS OF ECOLE AGAPE, INC.

The year 2023 has been an extremely difficult year for Haiti and for Ecole Agape. Haiti is in crisis. Violent gangs grow in power and number and continue to block humanitarian efforts and access to the country's main fuel terminal. Hospitals have had to reduce their capacity or close their doors, despite this year's cholera outbreak. Most schools have closed intermittently and some for the entire school year. The cost of food and gas has skyrocketed.

Haiti's political landscape continues to be unstable. Haiti failed to hold planned elections in 2019 and again in 2023, leaving the country without a legislature. Haitians are frustrated and desperate for change.

ECOLE AGAPE STUDENTS AND THE ACADEMIC SCHOOL YEAR.

The Official Haitian 2022-23 School Year began on September 5, 2022 and ended June 30, 2023. Despite several closings due to protests and gang activity, Ecole Agape was open to students 129 days or approximately 68 percent of the school year. Twelve (12) sixth graders were honored in a graduation ceremony on July 11.



Students did not wear their school uniforms for security reasons. When school was in session, classes included computer training for the fifth and sixth graders and an evening session for teenagers learning to read and write. Older students attended a workshop on the use of the tablets downloaded with books in French, English, Spanish and Creole. The nurse conducted sex education classes, teaching the students about their bodies, hygiene, puberty, menstrual cycles, reproductive organs, and safe sexual behaviors.

Thirty-three students attended Saturday sewing classes using materials sent by Friends of Ecole Agape. Seamstresses, Claudine

and Dorothy, taught students sewing skills: hand stitching, sewing, pattern design and clothing design. As the students progress, they will be taught embroidery, crochet, and the use of the sewing machines.

THE SCHOOL YEAR FROM SEPTEMBER 25 – DECEMBER 2023

School opened September 25th with ten (10) brave teachers and students who dared venture into the streets. The next day twenty-one (21) teachers and more students arrived despite continuing gunshots in the street. By mid-November, the school was at full enrollment and a dozen extra plastic chairs had to be purchased for the new students enrolled in the preschool. More students than usual had to repeat classes when the 2023-2024 school year began because they could not get to school safely.

The Dominican Republic closed its border to Haiti in September. The roads were blocked by gangs stopping the delivery of agricultural and food supplies. Food for the Poor has resumed the delivery of rice and beans to Ecole Agape, while Friends of Ecole Agape has increased the food budget in response to the escalating food prices. With the rising food insecurity, staff sent food to families via students whenever it was safe.

CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE ECOLE AGAPE STAFF

The staff responded to the chaotic neighborhood landscape and increasing gang violence. They staggered the times of daily classes so no large group of students would be arriving at the same time. Staff were available to students who were able to attend and stayed after hours to help students make up missed assignments. To increase security at Ecole Agape, a security guard was hired to oversee the safety of students and personnel.

He developed a safety protocol, instructing them on how to respond when there are shootings outside of the school. His presence has been a calming influence on the students and staff. Additionally, he assists the staff with attendance and record keeping.

Staff training included the preparation, distribution, and supervision of teachers' planning books as well as homework plans to reinforce the educational objectives. The teachers met with parents at the beginning, middle and end of the school year.

Every May 17th is Teachers' Day, a national holiday in Haiti. On this special occasion, the students thank educators for guiding and motivating them. At Ecole Agape, students honor their teachers by creating cards, bringing fruits and other gifts.

May 18th is Flag Day, a national holiday in Haiti. Ecole Agape students parade about the school with Haitian Flags to celebrate.

In December, the Librarian organized a competition for the most beautiful letter to Santa Claus. Poignantly, some of the children asked Santa Claus for peace in their neighborhood and country instead of toys. The Director of Food Services prepared a luncheon and the staff distributed toys to the students.



FRIENDS OF ECOLE AGAPE INITIATIVES: JANUARY THROUGH MARCH

Friends of Ecole Agape hosted its 4th Annual Chili Cook Off on January 28, 2023. Twenty-three chefs participated, while Windham Golf Course donated the prize money for the top three chefs. Storrs Therapeutic Massage provided massage, donating the proceeds to Ecole Agape. Curtis Brand provided the musical entertainment.

In February, eight tablets with 1,000 "open source" books downloaded in French, Spanish, Creole, and English were sent to Haiti. Friends of Ecole Agape purchased the tablets to be sent to Ecole Agape and contributed to the salary of a Haitian man who translates French into Creole. The Wicks demonstrated the digital library app that can be installed on iPads and Samsung tablets and discussed its potential with the tablets to members at the March 9th meeting.

APRIL THROUGH JUNE

Friends of Ecole Agape approved the funds to purchase a generator, solar panels, batteries, and a water filtration system for the school. However, the purchase of this equipment was deferred because of the violent protests and the amount of gang activity near the school. A barrel containing eighty (80) menstruation kits with instructions in French and Creole, 32 Solar Lights, fabric pieces, and a variety of school supplies was sent in June.

JULY THROUGH SEPTEMBER

Friends of Ecole Agape hosted their 8th Annual Barbecue and Concert on September 17th. Chef Ken Tierney and Sous-Chefs Connor and Ryan Tierney prepared the entrees, and Friends of Ecole Agape provided water, soda and a variety of side dishes and desserts. Businesses that donated food included Dog Lane Café, Price Chopper, and Fenton River Grill. For the 3rd year, UConn students from the School of Pharmacy manned the food tent and assisted with parking. Patty Tuite provided the sound system and organized the musical lineup: Curtis Brand, Karen Lussier, Hugh Blumenfeld, and the Patty Tuite Band.

Attendees wrote personal notes to teachers and students at Ecole Agape for the opportunity to win a Cornhole Game. The Barbecue loyalty award goes to Bill Ahoo, who at age 106, has never missed a barbecue & concert. He usually goes for the chicken. Google his name to find out why.





In September, Jeannette Picard organized and manned the Friends of Ecole Agape booth at the 20th Celebrate Mansfield Festival, generating awareness and interest in Ecole Agape and Haiti.

OCTOBER THROUGH DECEMBER

In October, Susan Moynihan translated the personal notes from the Barbeque and emailed them to Ecole Agape students and teachers. In November, Marie Michele emailed back the teachers' responses:
